One of the most challenging verses and Christian responsibilities in the bible is found in James 1:19, there God instructs us to be "slow to anger." Scripture does not say to never, ever be angry, but God clearly directs us to be slow to get there. We read in other verses of the Lord's expectations for us to exercise self-control (Gal. 5:22-23; 2 Pet. 1:5-7).

FAITHFULNESS

"Be faithful until death, and I will give you the crown of life."

Revelation 2:10

So, how? How can I be "slow to anger"? The book of Proverbs states, "A quick-tempered man acts foolishly" (14:17), but "he who is slow to anger is better than the mighty" (16:32). Then the bible reveals these insights: "The discretion of a man makes him slow to anger" (19:11). "He who restrains his lips is wise" (10:19). "The slow to anger calms a dispute" (15:18).

Romans 12 presents the practical responsibilities of the one who is "a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God" (v. 1). Putting these principles of Romans 12 into practice will enable a faithful Christian to be slow to anger: Do not think of oneself "more highly than you ought to think" (v. 3). "Be kindly affectionate to one another with brotherly love, in honor giving preference to one another...continuing steadfastly in prayer...bless and do not curse...Be of the same mind toward one another...Do not be wise in your own opinion...Repay no one evil for evil... live peaceably with all men...give place to wrath... overcome evil with good" (12:10-21).

The book of James teaches us that "the anger of man does not achieve the righteousness of God" (1:20), therefore, anger ought to be very slow in developing in our hearts, as we "lay aside all filthiness and overflow of wickedness, and receive with meekness the implanted word, which is able to save your souls" (1:21). How can we do that? "Be swift to hear." "Be...slow to speak" (1:19). Be "peaceable, gentle, willing to yield, full of mercy and good fruits" (3:17).

How can I be "slow to anger"? By letting God and His Word work on my heart! In a world today that is rooted it seems in anger and violence, may we as God's children be that quiet, peaceful, calm voice. Next time you are tempted to speak out in anger or post on social media in frustration and anger. Stop! Hear God and be willing to submit to the good that lies within us as Christians.

May we always show the love of God in that we do and say! God Bless -Todd

What is meant by seeking Him? The remainder of chapter 11 answers this question. A long list of faithful heroes is given that pleased God by faith. These individuals believed that He is and diligently sought God by obeying Him. We must do the same today! The faith that saves is the faith that obeys. Anything short of this has never pleased God. What kind of faith do you have? Have you allowed your faith to lead you to repent, confess Christ, and be baptized for the remission of sins? Is your faith motivating you to daily seek to please Him?






