WHO BLESSES AND BLESSES AGAIN.

Throughout the Old Testament, it is recorded for us how the Israelites complained, cried, wept, were ungrateful, murmured, were rebellious and disobedient to God. The same could probably be said of many people in today's world, they complain, seem ungrateful, are rebellious and disobedient to God's commands. We have this Old Testament record so that we can learn about the one true and living God and from the history of the children of Israel. Indeed, Paul's inspired pen was correct when he wrote, "For whatever things were written before were written for our learning, that we through the patience and comfort of the Scriptures might have hope" (Romans 15:4). When you look at these people of old and you look at yourself there are a few questions that jump out at you. 1) Does being thankful describe our attitude? 2) Does being thankful describe our behavior? Consider what the word says we should consider as we think more this time of year about the attitude of thankfulness, though as Christians it should be our attitude daily.

Be content. Hebrews 13:5 says, "Let your conduct be without covetousness; be content with such things as you have. For He Himself has said, 'I will never leave you nor forsake you." Contentment doesn't necessarily mean satisfied. But carries with it the idea of thankfulness and a focus on how God has blessed us. Contentment goes against the societal norm. The desire for more and more pushes people beyond thankful attitudes to more like ungrateful children. Paul seems to understand contentment, for he said in Philippians 4:11, "..for I have learned in whatever state I am, to be content." Certainly contentment brings peace.

Count your blessings, look for the good every day and be thankful. The Psalmist said, "Enter into His gates with thanksgiving, and into His courts with praise. Be thankful to Him and bless His name" (Psalm 100:4). Paul wrote in Colossians 3:15 to "let the peace of God rule in your hearts, to which also you were called in one body; and be thankful." It indeed would be a good practice to often count our many blessings and see what truly God has done for us.

Trust, specifically trust the Lord. While in the history of God's people, God recognizes both sins of ignorance and sins of presumption, He still calls both of them sin. And, there are consequences for both. Not knowing God's commands was no excuse then nor is it now. And, the only hope we have is to trust in Him and obey His commands. Trust and obey for there's no other way to be happy in the Lord, but to trust and obey. Be faithful always!

Paul's hope was built on things unseen, things eternal.

Look at the world around you. The world is broken and crying out for hope. Every disaster and violent outburst reminds us of our need for redemption, for a Savior. Every headline highlights the devastating power of sin, explaining how a perfect, flawless world became broken. Paul understood that control and comfort are just temporary illusions. We can chase them, but

illusions. We can chase them, but eventually, they will slip through our fingers. Life will trip us up. Then what will you do? When suffering hits, there's one choice: run towards God or run away. 
Joyce **Borton** 1941-2022
